Angles - People from Germany who invaded Britain around AD 410.

Anglo-Saxon: The name given to the people who travelled from Germany and South Denmark and settled in Britain around AD 410.

Pagan: A religion that involves worshipping many gods and goddesses.

Picts: Ancient tribes who lived in northern Scotland.

Romans: The Romans invaded and settled in Britain for over 400 years, starting with their first successful raid in 54 BC.

Saxons: People from northern and central Germany who invaded Britain around AD 410.

Scots: People from Ireland who eventually settled in Scotland.

Invasion: To try and take over a place by

force.

Key facts

- By around 410 AD, the last of the Romans had returned home and left Britain vulnerable to invasions.
- The Picts and Scots were a constant threat to Britain especially without the Romans for support.
- Other tribes also invaded Britain including the Angles and Saxons, known as the Anglo-Saxons.
- Many areas, towns and villages in Britain are named after the Anglo-Saxons who first settled here.
- The early Anglo-Saxons were Pagans. They would worship gods during festivals and make sacrifices of objects and animals.
- In 597 AD, a Roman monk was sent to tell the Anglo-Saxons about Christianity.





Who were the Anglo-Saxons and where did they come from?

They were a mix of tribes from Germany, Denmark and the Netherlands. The three biggest were the Angles, the Saxons and the Jutes. The land they settled in was 'Angleland', or England.

Why did the Anglo-Saxons come to Britain?

Britain needed help so King Vortigern invited some Anglo-Saxons to Britain to help defeat the Picts and Scots. However, when they did, they decided to invade and settle in Britain themselves. Some Anglo-Saxons were warriors who enjoyed fighting. They thought the Britons were weak and easy to beat without the Romans around.
