In what ways do Christians of different denominations worship?

Star Vocabulary

a font – a large stone bowl containing holy water used to baptise babies.

a stoup – usually a small basin containing holy water, which Catholics dip their hand in to make the sign of the cross to renew their baptism promises.

a confessional – a small, enclosed cupboard or cabinet, where Catholics can confess their sins to the priest.

Sacrament: a religious ceremony or ritual regarded as imparting divine grace, such as baptism, the Eucharist and (in the Roman Catholic and many Orthodox Churches) penance and the anointing of the sick.

Worship: acts of religious praise, honour or devotion

Liturgical worship: A church service that follows a set structure or ritual

Non-liturgical worship: a service that does not follow a set text or ritual

Informal worship: a type of non-liturgical worship, sometimes 'spontaneous' or 'charismatic' in nature

Private worship: when a believer praises or honours God on their own

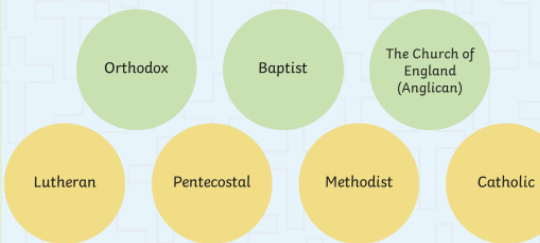
Eucharist: the Christian service/ceremony which recalls the Last Supper, in which bread and wine are consecrated and consumed

Mass: another name for the Eucharist (used by Roman Catholics)

Denominations

A denomination is a group within the church as a whole, who have come together because of a particular set of beliefs. Some of the major denominations are:

- The bible is for: necessity, clarity and sufficiency.
