What do Muslims celebrate?

Star Vocabulary

<u>Prophets:</u>	a person regarded as an inspired teacher or proclaimer of the will of God.
<u>Islamic New Year:</u>	It occurs on the first day of the month of Muharram, which is the first month in the Islamic lunar calendar.
<u>Day of Ashura:</u>	Ashura means 'tenth'. The 10 th day of Muharram, the first month in the Islamic calendar.
<u>Mawlid al Nabi:</u>	The celebration of Prophet Muhammad's birthday
<u>Ramadan:</u>	the ninth month of the Muslim year, during which strict fasting is observed from dawn to sunset.
<u>Eid al-Fitr</u>	Eid is a celebration at the end of Ramadan.
<u>Haji:</u>	The Hajj is one of the Five Pillars of Islam. It is a holy pilgrimage to Mecca.
<u>Qur'an</u>	The holy book read by Muslims
