Developing Identify where a capital letter should be used. Sentences include Phase 2/3 words that are CVC and CVCC/CCVC.

Expected Identify where a capital letter should be used. Includes some instances of the correct use of 'I' elsewhere in the sentence. Sentences include Phase 5 and some common exception words.

Greater Depth Identify where capital letters should be used. Includes some instances of the correct use of 'I' and capitalised dates elsewhere in the sentence. Sentences include Phase 5, polysyllabic words and common exception words.

Questions 3, 6 and 9 (Application and Reasoning)

Developing Rewrite and complete the sentences with correct punctuation. Sentences include Phase 2/3 words that are CVC and CVCC/CCVC.

Expected Rewrite and complete the sentences with correct punctuation. Includes some instances of the correct use of 'I' elsewhere in the sentence. Sentences include Phase 5 and some common exception words.

Greater Depth Rewrite and complete the sentences with correct punctuation. Includes some instances of the correct use of '1' and capitalised dates elsewhere in the sentence. Sentences include Phase 5, polysyllabic words and common exception words.

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


