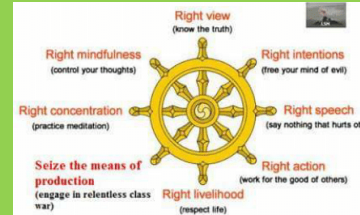

The Five Precepts

Buddhists follow a set of rules called the Five Precepts. They are:

1. Not to kill or harm living things
2. Not to take things that are not freely given
3. Not to have wrong relationships
4. Not to tell lies or speak unkindly
5. Not to drink alcohol or take drugs



Three Jewels of Buddhism

1. Buddha (the teacher)
2. dharma (the teaching)
3. sangha (the community of believers)



Facts

- Siddhartha leaves the palace that he lives in one night. He sees an elderly person, a sick person and a corpse. This makes him think about the true meaning of life.
- The Eightfold Path consists of eight areas of life that people focus on towards the path of Buddhism. They can be worked on in any order and some are more difficult to achieve than others depending on the situation or the person.
- It is designed to relieve suffering.
- Karma determines where a person will be reborn and how they will live in their next life. Good karma can result in being born in one of the heavenly realms. Bad karma can cause rebirth as an animal, or torment in a hell realm.
