

Facts

- According to Muslim belief, the last Prophet of Islam was the Prophet Muhammad (570-632CE). He was born in the Arabian city of Makkah and from the age of forty received a series of revelations from God (in Arabic, Allah). The revelations are believed to have come to Muhammad through the Angel Jibra'il (also known as Jibril or Gabriel) over a period of twenty-three years.
- The Muslim holy book is called the Qur'an. Muslims believe this to be the word of Allah as dictated to Muhammad.
- They also have the Sunnah, which Muslims believe to be the practical example of Prophet Muhammad.
- There are five key practices that all Muslims are obligated to fulfil throughout their lifetime. The declaration of faith (Shahada) Praying five times a day (Salat) Giving money to charity (Zakah) Fasting during the month of Ramadan (Sawm)
