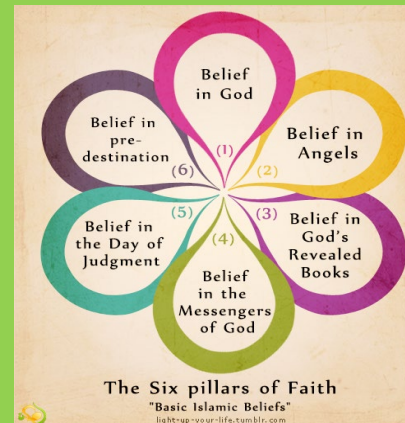
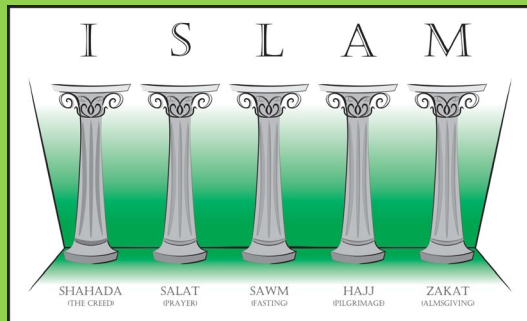

Star Vocabulary

Prophets:	a person regarded as an inspired teacher or proclaimer of the will of God.
Shahada:	the Muslim profession of faith ('there is no god but Allah, and Muhammad is the messenger of Allah'), one of the Five Pillars of Islam.
Shirk:	avoid or neglect (a duty or responsibility).
Taqwa:	the fear and consciousness of Allah
Jihad:	is struggle or effort, and it means much more than holy war.
Imam:	the person who leads prayers in a mosque.
Lailut-al-Qadr	The night of power
Ramadan:	the ninth month of the Muslim year, during which strict fasting is observed from dawn to sunset.



Facts

- According to Muslim belief, the last Prophet of Islam was the Prophet Muhammad (570-632CE). He was born in the Arabian city of Makkah and from the age of forty received a series of revelations from God (in Arabic, Allah). The revelations are believed to have come to Muhammad through the Angel Jibra'il (also known as Jibril or Gabriel) over a period of twenty-three years.
- The Muslim holy book is called the Qur'an. Muslims believe this to be the word of Allah as dictated to Muhammad.
- They also have the Sunnah, which Muslims believe to be the practical example of Prophet Muhammad.
- There are five key practices that all Muslims are obligated to fulfil throughout their lifetime. The declaration of faith (Shahada) Praying five times a day (Salat) Giving money to charity (Zakah) Fasting during the month of Ramadan (Sawm) A pilgrimage to Makkah at least once in a lifetime (Hajj)
