Plot: A plan made in secret by a group of people to do something illegal or harmful.

Execute: Carry out a death sentence of death on a criminal.

Treason: The crime of betraying your country by trying to kill the king or queen.

The Gunpowder Plot: A plot to blow up the Houses of Parliament to kill King James I and his government.

Catholics: Members of the Catholic church.

Protestants: Christians who are not Catholic.

Houses of Parliament: The building in London where the government works.

Gunpowder: An explosive powder that was used in guns.

Key Facts

- The Gunpowder Plot was a **plot** to kill **King James I** and his government by blowing up the Houses of Parliament.
- The plotters were Robert Catesby, **Guy Fawkes**, Thomas Percy, and five of their friends.
- Guy Fawkes was **executed** because he committed the crime of treason (31st January 1606)
- We celebrate **Bonfire night** because King James I ordered that people should celebrate his survival on the **5th November**.

Timeline of Events

13th April 1570 Guy Fawkes is born.	24th March 1603 King James I becomes King of England.	May 1604 The group begin to plot against King James I.	31st January 1606 Guy Fawkes is executed.
26th October 1605 Lord Monteagle, who is a Catholic, receives an unsigned letter that warns him not to go to the opening of Parliament on the 5 th November.	March 1605 The plotters rent a cellar under the Houses of Parliament.	5th November 1605 Guy Fawkes is found in the cellar with 36 barrels of gunpowder by the king's guards.	

The Plotters

Guy Fawkes was born on 13th April 1570, in York. He lived over 400 years ago!

To this day, people still light bonfires and burn 'guys' (puppets made of straw, named after Guy Fawkes) to celebrate.
